## Mother and Son – Finding Their Path

"We have had mountains of blessings." Gratitude emanates from Sandy Stinson. From the outside looking in, not everyone could or would have her fortitude. Sandy raised Patrick, her only child and a Trellis client, by herself. She supported them by working as an LPN. Her career started in New Jersey assisting those in physical rehabilitation. Little did she know at the time her training would be a necessity in providing care for her son. She says her Winston-Salem home has become a care facility for Patrick. When Patrick was twelve, he had his first seizure. His neurologist told Sandy and Patrick that he would "grow out of it." Patrick was denied this healing. He was a popular high school student. Charismatic, charming, and handsome, Patrick played and loved football. Sandy says she held her breath the whole season in fear of her son seizing on the field or developing other injuries. Patrick was also in R.O.T.C. He was an expert, award winning rifleman. He planned to join the military after graduation. Yet, due to his epilepsy, he was denied the dream of serving his country.

Patrick, taking a different path, trained with Job Corps and became a chef. He had a knack for cooking and developed a specialty seven-layer lasagna. Employed and happy as a chef, his first major injury occurred. This meant, yet again, a new path for Patrick. For a time, he had a smoothie business inside the Glade Street YWCA. The ladies at the Y loved to spend time, money and (perhaps) flirtation with Patrick as he served them smoothies and smiles.



Patrick is also a single dad to his daughter Camry. Camry grew up in the home with Sandy and Patrick. She lives in Greensboro and deeply loves her father and grandmother.

Seizure after seizure took a toll on Patrick. His 6'6" height colliding with cement, pavement, and hard surfaces did irreparable damage to his spine and brain. His medical condition included a significant level-four bed sore, which landed him in the ICU. At this time, he would need to have his legs amputated. "At no time did his doctors tell us he was not a candidate for prosthetics," Sandy says. Patrick's dream of walking again was denied.

The doctors projected Patrick would have only a couple of months to live. "We could have put him in a nursing home, or Trellis' Hospice Home. That was an easy decision. The Trellis team focused on Patrick's overall wellbeing. He is back home, and his care is a total package," Sandy says. Under Trellis' care, Patrick enjoys music therapy twice a month with Sarah. He is tremendously proud of the four (and a half) songs he has written. Through this complementary therapy of instruments and song, he has been able to release difficult feelings and regain precious dormant memories in a safe space. He was able to share his gratitude to a dear friend through these lyrics:

You came to see me there Reminded me who I am You showed your love and care Your hearts were there!

The layering of care Trellis provides has extended to Sandy. Caregivers rarely get a break, but thanks to Patrick's social worker, Celestia, she does now. "She sees me. I used to cry all day and stay up all night.

Now I don't. With Trellis' respite program I've been able to take a break and go on vacation. I don't worry about Patrick. He is thrilled to go back to the Hospice Home and see his friends," says Sandy.

Patrick has an energy, a force of happiness, and positivity. He wants his days to be fulfilling and replete with love. Thanks to Sandy and the Trellis team, that will not be denied.
